## Keynote Speakers

### **Professor Ramesh Deosaran**

Professor Ramsesh Deosaran is widely known for his work in criminology and the social sciences, he is now Professor Emeritus of Criminology and Social Psychology at the University of the West Indies, Trinidad and Tobago. He is currently Programme Professor at the Centre for Criminology and Public Safety at the University of Trinidad and Tobago. He also serves as an Independent Senator in the Parliament of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago. He is an active research and policy development specialist in several multidisciplinary areas such as crime and justice, school violence and juvenile delinquency, poverty, police and prison reform, educational administration, governance and civil society.

### **Professor David Plummer**

David Plummer is Adjunct Professor in Public Health/Health Promotion at the University of Texas, Houston. Until recently he was also the Commonwealth/UNESCO Caribbean Professor in Education at the University of the West Indies. His research is in Gender, marginalization and health, and stigma and discrimination. He is the lead researcher in a key project investigating Caribbean masculinities in Guyana, Trinidad and Tobago, Grenada, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, St. Lucia, St. Kitts and Nevis, Anguilla and Jamaica. The project examines the relationship between masculinities and (i) problems that boys are having with education (ii) shifting crime patterns and (iii) men's risk-taking. David is both a physician and he has a Ph.D. in Health Sociology. In 2003 he was made a Member of the Order of Australia for his contribution to Public Health in that country.
