OUR HISTORY

The UWI is the oldest, fully regional institution of

higher learning in the Commonwealth Caribbean.

The UWI began at the Mona Campus, Jamaica, in 1948 as a College of the University of London; and in 1962 achieved full university status. The St. Augustine Campus in Trinidad and Tobago was established in 1961 and in 1963 a third Campus was established at Cave Hill in Barbados. In 2008 the University established a fourth Campus – The Open Campus – to better manage and expand multi-mode delivery of its programmes.

OUR FACULTIES

The seven Faculties of The UWI offer a wide range of Undergraduate, Master's and Doctoral programmes in Food & Agriculture, Humanities & Education, Engineering, Law, Medical & Veterinary Sciences, Science & Technology; and Social Sciences. THE FACULTY OF HUMANITIES & EDUCATION

The Faculty of Humanities and Education came into being on August 1, 1996 and comprises the School of Humanities (formerly Faculty of Arts and General Studies) and the School of Education (formerly the Faculty of Education). The School of Humanities comprises the Department of History, the Department of Literary, Cultural and Communication Studies, the Department of Modern Languages and Linguistics, the Department of Creative and Festival Arts and the Centre for Language Learning.

SPANISH PROGRAMME

The Spanish section is one of four Sections and the English Language Foundation Unit in the Department of Modern Languages and Linguistics (DMLL). The DMLL was created in 2012, formerly being a part of the much larger Liberal Arts Department. At the undergraduate level, the Section currently offers the Major in Spanish and the Minor in Spanish programmes. At the postgraduate level, the MA in Spanish is a taught programme and the section also offers the MPhil in Spanish and PhD in Spanish.

QUALIFICATIONS

The successful candidate must possess a Master's degree in Spanish / Spanish as a Foreign Language or Postgraduate Foreign Language Teacher Certification. Candidates should have teaching experience at the tertiary level and knowledge of recent foreign language teaching methodologies.

DUTIES OF THE INSTRUCTOR

The successful applicant will be responsible for the following:

- Teaching courses mainly in the undergraduate programmes in Spanish;
- Designing and developing courses and programmes in Spanish as part of a team
- Collaborating with colleagues in teaching, administration, cultural and extra-curricular events organized by the Section or the DMILL
- Supervising undergraduate research projects and participating in Academic Advising

NOTE: Members of staff may be called upon to deliver teaching in either or both of these modes – blended classes as well as face-to-face teaching.



Personal Attributes

The Department places high priority on individuals who can work well in a team environment. Candidates should also possess good communication and interpersonal skills and must be student-centered. Candidates should have a good command (B1) of both oral and written English. Candidates must also have the:

- ability to work in a multidisciplinary environment
- capacity to work collaboratively toward common goals and meet very specific deadlines

- technological competencies particular to a web-enabled learning environment

There will be a screening exercise as part of the selection process. Strong consideration will be given to native speakers
