Marking five years

of DAOC's modern
diplomacy training and dialogue
on the relationship between
diplomacy and the Caribbean, in
August 2019, a commemorative
e-booklet of the five-year anni-
versary of the DAOC, titled:
['Reinventing Diplomatic
Education: The DAOC's Story so
far, its Future-focused Agenda,
and the Issues that Inform its
Role'](#), was published online by
the Diplomatic Academy.

In 2019, 69 learners

from four
countries and one British
Overseas Territory in the
Caribbean matriculated at the
DAOC, successfully completing
the respective teaching program-
mes and conferred with a certifi-
cate of training. And dozens of
stakeholders took part in Institute
of International Relations (IIR)/
DAOC-facilitated [Diplomatic
Dialogues](#) and other outreach

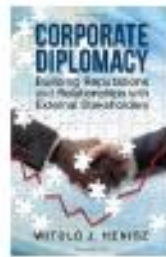
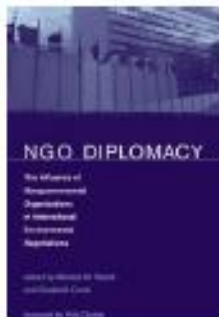
