The first of UWI's five campuses began in 1948 at Mona, Jamaica, as a College of the University of London. About the St Augustine Campus Libraries

The UWI St. Augustine Campus Libraries are the repository and gateway for information in support of the teaching, learning and research needs of the University community and Caribbean society. The Campus Libraries aim to develop an information literate community through the establishment and continuous improvement of an innovative information environment, the provision of excellent service and the continued development of our human resources.

There is currently an integrated network of 5 libraries at St Augustine: The Alma Jordan Library, The Medical Sciences Library, The Norman Girvan Library at The Institute of International Relations Library, The School of Education Library and The Republic Bank Library at the Arthur Lok Jack Graduate School of Business. These libraries serve specific Departments and Faculties, but their resources can be used by all members of staff and students of the University.

Items in the collections of these five libraries can be found in a single Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC). This OPAC is integrated into the recently established Single Virtual Library Space (UWILinC), which provides a single point of access to the print and digital information resources of all four campuses of the University. UWISpace, our institutional repository, serves as a digital archiving facility for the research output of the University. A sixth library being operationalised as part of the UWI St. Augustine Campus Library network in 2024 is the Eric Williams Memorial Library which is located in Port of Spain.

The Eric Williams Memorial Library

The Eric Williams Memorial Library (EWML) is home to the Eric Williams Memorial Collection, Research Library, Archives and Museum. It is the University of the West Indies St Augustine Campus Libraries largest research collection. It documents the life and times of Dr. Eric Williams, first Prime Minister of Trinidad and Tobago, international statesman, and esteemed scholar.

Comprising Williams' personal papers, photographs, his own extensive library, as well a large range of artifacts, the material depicts various aspects of Dr. Williams' life and his contribution to Trinidad and Tobago, the Caribbean region, and the world. The Collection was named to the UNESCO Memory of the World Register in 1999. This Register is a global compendium of documents, manuscripts, oral traditions, audio-visual materials, library, and archival holdings of universal value and worldwide significance.

The Eric Williams Memorial Library is located at the corner Knox and Pembroke Streets, Port of Spain on the site of the old Trinidad Public Library which was opened to the public in 1902. The facility will now comprise a museum (open to the general public) and a research library serving researchers mainly by appointment. The EWML will be linked to the Campus Libraries network and users will also have access to the digital information resources and platforms owned and subscribed to by The UWI.

Tenure of Appointment

Appointment as Librarian III/II will normally be for three (3) years in the first instance, with eligibility for consideration for renewal.

Subsequent to the first appointment, a member of staff who has served in an equivalent position in this or some other University for a period of six (6) years will be eligible for consideration for indefinite tenure.

Appointment to this post is subject to the <u>Charter of the University and to its Statutes</u>, <u>Ordinances, Rules and Regulations</u>, including Statute 36 – Retirement of Members of Staff.

Qualifications and Experience

The successful candidate must possess an accredited Master's degree in Library and Information Science or Archives and Records Management.

Candidates must also possess:

- Experience supporting research and reference services
- Functional knowledge of cataloguing standards and metadata schema such as MARC, RDA, EAD, and Dublin Core etc.
- Capacity to contribute to the development of library services through the harnessing of appropriate technologies and communication channels

Candidates with the following would have an advantage:

- Experience working in an academic/research library, or a special collections/archives environment
- Proficiency in the use of integrated library systems, and electronic databases
- Competence in the development of policies and procedures to ensure quality library services

Evidence of a record of research and publication in the field of Library and Information Science or other subject disciplines would be considered an asset.

Special Responsibilities

- Cataloguing special collections materials/artifacts.
- Effectively creating and enhancing descriptive metadata in digital repositories and platforms, applying appropriate schema based on standards, best practices, and the needs for digital collections.
- Preparing project plans and leads, coordinating or participating in projects relating to collection development and acquisition and collection management and access, including preservation and digitization activities.
- Identifying opportunities for service and quality improvement and developing efficient and effective workflows and procedures.
- Providing advice, training and guidance to less experienced staff to enable them to undertake their duties effectively.
- Working collaboratively with University and Campus Libraries' Teams on initiatives which support teaching, learning and research goals of the institution.

- Maintaining current awareness of developments and trends in the field of Library and Information Science and/or archives management.
- Engaging in research, publication and scholarly communication activities as expected of an academic librarian employed with The University of the West Indies.

Personal Attributes

The Campus places high priority on individuals of integrity who are client focused and can work well in a team and student friendly environment. Candidates should also possess good communication and interpersonal skills. A good command of both oral and written English is essential. Candidates should also:
