## Take a Dip, See Your Future

Do you know you can register for courses in UWI postgraduate programmes as an **occasional** or **specially admitted student**? The UWI's Department of Literary, Cultural and Communication Studies invites you to consider taking one or two of its postgraduate offerings this January 2018 beginning with health communication and/or another course. If you have a first degree with at least honours (Second or First Class or a GPA of 2.0 or higher) or a suitable first degree and combination of experience and training in one of the fields listed below you may be eligible to enrol as an **occasional** student (with no examinations) or a **specially admitted** student (with examinations and credits). Your entry will be based on satisfying university matriculation (entry) requirements and postgraduate study regulations. Applications will be reviewed on a competitive basis. Classes begin Monday January 22 and end April 16 2018. Minimum study: one three-hour class and individual three-hour study reading, writing and completing assignments per week.

- Health communication professionals in medicine, dentistry, nursing, veterinary medicine, pharmacy;
- Health communication professionals working as communication assistants, officers and managers in the health and other public and private sector areas; health and/or sport journalism; social marketing of health
- Advocates for patient rights, gender rights, child rights, health and sexual reproductive rights, gender-based violence; social and behavioural change
- Volunteers and activists working on reducing and eliminating health disparities and social support;
- Members or employees of community-based, faith-based, citizen-based organizations and activist groups interested in upgrading their knowledge, skills and competencies in health communication;
- Employees in the Ministry of Health, Gender & Child Affairs, Sport & Youth Affairs, regional health authorities
- Employees in health insurance, health provider and health managed organizations with an interest in patient advocacy, patient safety, customer care, provider-patient/caregiver/family communication and service in these areas
- Advertising and campaign assistants, officers and managers interested in health issues and topics;
- Planners, policy-makers, researchers and evaluators in health communication policy and practice; academics or students needing an elective in health communication for your research project, thesis and dissertation topics;

then this may be the right postgraduate course for you to explore.
